A FAMILY STORY: Meet Julian & Donna

"Julian was first introduced to Holland Bloorview's research institute about 10 years ago. At that time, Julian's classmates in kindergarten were using the computer, but because of his cerebral palsy, he couldn't operate the mouse. Over the next few years, we explored different solutions for access, before being introduced to Dr. Tom Chau at Holland Bloorview and the Hummer.

The Hummer enabled Julian to browse the Internet, send emails, and even do written homework. It helped him to complete tasks he wasn't able to before. But by the time he entered high school he craved more. Julian wanted the ability to do things on his own.

We've met some of the most amazing researchers at Holland Bloorview's research institute and seen their passion to improve the lives of children like Julian. I am confident that one day soon, Julian will have the technology that will help him to be as independent as he can be. Like them – we haven't given up."

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A FAMILY STORY: Meet the Brown Family

"I chose to be a part of research to support my advocacy efforts for kids who have acquired brain injury (ABI). It's important for educators to hear kids' stories to increase their understanding of ABI in the classroom, and improve reintegration into the school system. After meeting with Dr. Shannon Scratch (clinician scientist, Holland Bloorview), I was able to gain a deeper understanding about my own son's ABI and our role in supporting his learning needs. 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A FAMILY STORY Meet Alex & Jenn

Once completely non-verbal, six-year-old Alex Munro can now speak in full sentences and carry on conversations.

Alex, who was diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) when he was two years old, didn't speak or make eye contact with his parents and they didn't know whether he ever would. Then he began an innovative research program at Holland Bloorview's autism research centre (ARC), and it turned their lives around.

The Social ABCs, a12-week parent-mediated intervention, teaches parents strategies to help toddlers with their spoken language skills and positive emotion-sharing. It was developed by Dr. Jessica Brian, co-lead of ARC at Holland Bloorview, in partnership with Dr. Susan Bryson at the IWK Health Centre in Halifax.

"Hearing Alex's voice for the first time was incredible," says mom Jenn Potenza. "I will never forget the day he first said, 'Mom, I love you.' Just to hear them talk to you about something is the best feeling in the world."
