International Women's Day is a day for men and women, and boys and girls, to recognize and celebrate the unique value of women in every sphere. It's also a day where women, because of our shared experiences as women, intentionally uplift each other by celebrating our sisters' accomplishments and contributions.

Three of my role models are my mom and my pastors. My mom, because as a woman, wife, and mother, she exemplifies qualities and characteristics that I aspire to including courage, selfless



love, sacrificial giving and mental fortitude. My pastors (a husband-and-wife team) role model candor with a loving embrace and are highly skilled, effective and caring leaders.

Holland Bloorview is doing some things well to celebrate and support women. Further steps could include addressing safety concerns that some women encounter e.g., pregnant women can park on-site instead of off-site, pregnant women can get first choice on allocated parking spots in close proximity. Holland Bloorview can also readily provide the opportunity for all staff to share their ideas. This can easily be done over a relatively short period of time, using an unmanned station, inexpensive supplies, and some fun incentives.
